# Inclusive Easter egg hunt

Get ready for Easter with these creative ideas for an inclusive hunt that everyone can enjoy:

- Make it fair and not a race. Give each child a specific colour to hunt for and ensure there is the same number of eggs in each colour
- Follow the bunny. Draw bunny prints in chalk that lead to each egg
- Turn it into a treasure hunt. Give written or picture clues
- Make it easy to see or hear. Use beeping easter eggs or place eggs near a visual cue like a balloon
- Ensure eggs are easy to reach. Place eggs at the right height for children who are wheelchair users or who have limited mobility
- Sensory fun. Hide eggs in an easter-themed sensory tray
